## ACTIVITIES

### INFANTS (3 – 18 MONTHS)

### LAP SONG: BUMPING UP AND DOWN

MATERIALS:

**DIRECTIONS:** 

- Put your child on your lap and start singing while bouncing your child gently up and down.
- You can also sing this song while taking your baby for a walk in a stroller or wagon.

### TODDLERS (19 MONTHS - 2.5 YEARS)

#### A CAR WASH

MATERIALS:

- · Bucket
- · Water hose (optional)
- Soapy water
- Towels
- Sponges
- · Different vehicles (toy cars or plastic riding toys)

**DIRECTIONS:** 

- Set up all of the materials outside.
- Encourage your child to use sponges and soapy water to wash their vehicles.
- Washing cars is a great way to get children involved in imaginative play as well as a whole bunch of sensory experiences.

### PRESCHOOLERS (2.5 – 5 YEARS)

#### TRANSPORTATION MOVEMENT GAME

**DIRECTIONS:** 

- Call out the types of transportation, demonstrate them and let your child follow along with their version.
- Pretend with your child to be different vehicles and vessels: a big truck, honking a horn and rumbling; an airplane flying up high; a boat bobbing up and down on the water; or a train chugging along and whistling.
- · Take turns guessing what means of transportation you demonstrate.

## JK/SK (4 – 6 YEARS) CARDBOARD ROCKET

#### MATERIALS:

- · Cardboard tube (Paper towel roll)
- · Scissors
- · Paper
- · Markers or crayons
- Glue or tape

**DIRECTIONS:** 

- Cut a strip of paper that is the same height as the cardboard tube, cover the paper in glue and wrap it around the tube. This will form the body of the space rocket.
- Cut a large semi-circle out of paper, fold it into a cone and glue in place, and then stick the cone to the top of the rocket body.
- Cut three rocket 'leg' shapes out of another piece of paper and stick them to the bottom of the rocket. It should now stand up on its own.
- Draw windows and a door on the rocket.

### SCHOOL-AGERS (6 - 12 YEARS)

### TRANSPORTATION MOBILE

MATERIALS:

- String or yarn
- Coat hangers
- Thick paper
- Markers or crayons
- · Scissors
- Hole punch (optional)
- DIRECTIONS:
- · Create drawings of various modes of transportation on thick paper.
- · Decorate the pictures with markers or crayons.
- · Cut out the pictures and put them together in a mobile.
- Punch holes in the pictures and hang them from a coat hanger with yarn.
- Have your child write facts on the back of each of their modes of transportation like trucks deliver newspapers; people travel on airplanes etc.
