## **ACTIVITIES**

# INFANTS (3 – 18 MONTHS)

## **OCEAN IN THE BOTTLE**

Click here to read "Baby Beluga" by Rafi.

- **MATERIALS:**
- Plastic bottle
- Small plastic fish (you can make your own by cutting some out from a plastic container)
- Tape
- **DIRECTIONS:**
- Fill the bottle with water.
- Add a plastic fish into the bottle.
- Close the bottle tightly and secure the cap with tape.
- Let your baby explore the fish in the water. Make comments and sing "Baby Beluga" as your child is exploring.

#### TODDLERS (19 MONTHS – 2.5 YEARS)

#### **BATH TIME FOR A BABY DOLL**

- **MATERIALS:**
- Baby doll
- Container
- Washcloth
- Soap (optional)
- Hand towel

**DIRECTIONS:** 

Help your child to fill the container with water.

- Add soap to make bubbles (optional).
- Put the doll and the washcloth inside the container. Let your child wash the doll.
- When finished, help your child gently wrap the doll in a towel. Rock the doll to sleep while reading the story.

# **PRESCHOOLERS (2.5 – 5 YEARS)**

#### MAKE A DOG PUPPET

<u>Click here</u> to read "Sterling, Best Dog Ever" by Aidan Cassie. MATERIALS:

- Construction paper
- Paper bag
- Glue
- Scissors
- Markers
- **DIRECTIONS:**
- Have your child cut eyes, mouth and ears out of construction paper and glue them onto the paper bag.
- Use markers to add details to the dog's mouth and paws.
- Next time you read the book, use the dog puppet as a prop to act out the story. <u>Click here</u> to read "Something from Nothing " by Phoebe Gilman.

# JK/SK (4 - 6 YEARS)

## PACK YOUR BACKPACK <u>Click here</u> to read "Franklin Goes to School" by Paulette Bourgeois.

**MATERIALS:** 

- Backpack
- Notebook
- Markers
- Hand sanitizer
- Face mask
- Favourite tov
- **DIRECTIONS:**
- Sit with your child and make a list of things they will put in their backpack.
- Help your child write each item on the list and have them draw a picture next to it.
- Talk about safety precautions and the need to use a face mask and hand sanitizer.
- Use the list to pack the backpack together.

### SCHOOL-AGERS (6 – 12 YEARS)

#### MAKE A SYRIAN DISH FROM EGGPLANT

<u>Click here</u> to read "Salma the Syrian Chef" by Ahmad Danny Ramadan. **MATERIALS:** 

- 1 eggplant
- 1 small tomato
- 1/2 cup parsley leaves
- 2 cloves of garlic
- 1 spoon of olive oil
- 1/2 cup pomegranate seeds
- ½ cup walnuts
- Pinch of salt and pepper

**DIRECTIONS:** 

- Use the eggplant that is already baked.
- Chop all ingredients (except olive oil and pomegranate seeds) and place them in a bowl.
- Mix well.
- Drizzle with some extra olive oil. Enjoy with pita bread.
