# **HELLO PARENTS,**

Community helpers are people who live and work in our communities. They provide goods and services to make life better for the people and help the communities function more efficiently. They are part of children's everyday lives. ### **INFANTS (3 – 18 MONTHS)**

### HURRY, HURRY DRIVE THE FIRETRUCK

DIRECTIONS:

- · Sing the song to your child and show them the different movements.
- · Act the song out as you sing.
- Do the movements together with your child.
- You can use a cardboard box as a firetruck while you sing the song.

## **TODDLERS (19 MONTHS – 2.5 YEARS)**

### **RUNAWAY BUS!**

## MATERIALS:

- · Chairs
- DIRECTIONS:
- $\cdot$   $\;$  Line up chairs in two rows to resemble your bus.
- Have your child sit in a chair.
- Together sing the song: "The Wheels on the Bus." For example, you may sing: "The people on the bus go up and down!"
- Suddenly, you may exclaim: "Runaway Bus!" When this is said, the children may get up from their seats and walk around the chairs.
- Then, you may say: "Emergency Brake!" When this is said, the children sit back down.

### CONSTRUCTING BUILDINGS

### MATERIALS:

- Legos
- DIRECTIONS:
- Let your children use Lego blocks to construct buildings.
- While your child is building, talk about structures, homes, towers etc. which you have seen in your community, and the construction workers who build them.
- When your child is finished building, discuss and compare the structures which they have created. For example, you may say: "Which buildings are larger or smaller?" or "What materials could construction workers use to make these buildings?"

- After you read the book, think of the people who make our community a better place. The list may include police officers who keep us safe, the doctors and nurses who help us stay healthy, teachers who help us learn, postal workers who deliver mail.
- Write a kindness card to a community helper of your choice.
- For example, you can make a kindness card for our waste collection operators that says: "Thank you for doing great work."
- Provide your community helper with the kindness card, which you made. For example: tape these to your garbage bins for the waste collection operators to receive.
- You can also make a "Thank-You" poster and hang it on your front door or balcony.
