HELLO PARENTS,

Show and tell (or show and share) is usually the first opportunity for young children to stand up in front of a small group and speak. Speaking in front of a group is an effective activity to encourage the use of descriptive language and develops a child's ability to retell stories leading to improved communication skills which are important throughout their lives. Children also develop the ability to answer questions well. Being part of a show and tell audience is also an important part of learning, where one learns to sit, listen closely and be respectful. In this newsletter, we provide show and tell activities.

ACTIVITIES

INFANTS (3 -18 MONTHS)

IT MAKES ME FEEL SAFE

MATERIALS:

• A favourite toy

DIRECTIONS:

- As you cuddle with your child before nap or bedtime, take your child's favourite toy with you.
- Make bedtime fun and part of the day that your child looks forward to!
- Play a quiet game before going to bed. For example, let your child show their favourite toy that makes them feel safe.

TODDLERS (19 MONTHS – 2.5 YEARS)

CHOOSE-AND TELL

MATERIALS:

- Different objects (small toys, greeting cards, spoons, buttons, flowers, or cookies etc.)
- A basket
- **DIRECTIONS:**
- Put the basket with different items in front of your child.
- Let your child pick one of the items.
- Ask your child simple question. For example: "What do you like about it?"," What does it feel, look, smell, taste, or sound like?" etc.
- Encourage your child to talk about the object selected.

PRESCHOOLERS (2.5 – 5 YEARS)

WHAT DO YOU KNOW ABOUT ME?

MATERIALS:

- A big paper or piece of cardboard
- Old magazines, flyers
- Scissors
- Glue

DIRECTIONS:

- Encourage your child to cut and collect pictures from magazines, that represent things they like. For example: foods, sports, or TV shows; and interesting facts such as, where they were born, how many family members or pets they have, etc.
- Let your child glue the pictures on the paper the way they like.
- During show-and-tell ask your child questions about each item and let them explain what it means.

JK/SK (4 – 6 YEARS)

SHOW AND TELL MY SKILLS - TYING SHOE LACES

MATERIALS:

- String or yarn at least 2 feet long
- Cardboard
- Markers, crayons, or coloured pencils

DIRECTIONS:

- As your child grows, they will learn new skills. Give them the opportunity to share and showcase these skills for their friends and family.
- Invite your child to practice, and share their shoe tying skills.
- Trace a shoe template on a piece of cardboard.
- Label top, bottom, left, and right on cardboard and colour the shoe any way you wish.
- Make holes in the specified places large enough to place string through.
- Now, it is time for Show and Tell! Invite your child to practice tying shoes, and showcase their skills for their friends and family.
- Your child can practice and share the following techniques:
 - Knot: Hold a lace in each hand, crisscross them into an X, then tuck one lace through the hole. Pull both laces to tighten.
 - Bunny ear: Using one lace, create a loop to look like a bunny's ear, and pinch it closed in your fingers.
 - Wrap: Direct your opposite hand to wrap the other lace around the bunny ear.
 - Bunny ear: Push the loose lace through the hole under it to make a second bunny ear.
 - Whiskers: Pull both ears to tighten. The ends of the laces become "whiskers" and should be about as long as the ears.

MY ADVENTURE

MATERIALS:

- Рарег
- Pictures and photographs

DIRECTIONS:

- Select a series of 3-4 favourite photographs from a single significant event such as, a holiday, vacation, sporting event, or recital.
- Arrange the photos in sequential order.
- Show and tell to your audience the story about your special event.
- This activity has the added narrative benefits of practicing sequencing events and teaching a sense of story.

A TIP FOR TODAY

- Encourage children to say a sentence or two about their object and ask prompting questions such as "What is it?", "Where did you get it?", and "How do you play with it?"
- Extend Show and Tell by creating themes that interest your child, such as a favourite board game, movie, animal, and toys.
- Encourage children to ask each other questions and only intervene when needed.
